

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BEGINNING OF VOLUME ONE HUNDRED SIXTEEN

Perhaps it is appropriate and beneficial to give the readers a bit of history concerning the past Editors and Associate Editors of this publication. Since such information has not been related for some while now possibly enough time has elapsed to make these facts fresh to many of our subscribers and interesting to reflect upon by those who have read them before. We are acutely aware of the fact that a worthy heritage does not make the Advocate a better paper than other Primitive Baptist publications. Neither is it with any appetite for glorying in this heritage that we recount such details but rather to assert our desire to carry on in the same honorable tradition of those dear men of God who have served so ably in the past. God being our helper we will not compromise those sacred principles for which they so courageously stood.

With this issue A and M enters its one hundred sixteenth year of publication. To my knowledge it is the oldest magazine in existence which has always contended for the doctrine and practice of the Old Line or Old School Primitive Baptists. The next oldest I believe would be "The Primitive Baptist" Edited by Elder Hartsel Cayce of Thornton, Arkansas. That paper is entering its ninety-first year.

The first issue of ZION'S ADVOCATE went forth from Front Royal, Virginia, in January of 1854 under the editorship of Elder John Clark, who filled that position for about thirty years. He published the paper regularly all that time except for about seven years during and after the war between the States. After his death it was published several years by J. G. Wiltshire; Elder T. S. Dalton was Editor for a few years; Elder J. R. Daily for eight years, and Dr. C. H. Waters for several years. (Elder Waters was a medical doctor).

In May of 1919 Elder R. H. Pittman purchased the paper from Elder Clark's widow, and in January, 1921, he bought The Messenger of Truth from Elder F. P. Branscomb, of Laurel Fork, Virginia, and merged it with the ADVO-CATE; and in March, 1923, he bought the Gospel Messenger from Elder Z. C. Hull who had purchased it from Elder Sylvester Hassell, and the "Advocate" and the "Messenger" were combined and since that time have been issued under the name of ADVOCATE AND MESSENGER. Elder Pittman Edited the paper until his death, March 14, 1941, and his widow served as Acting Editor for the remainder of that year. Elder T. P. Dalton, son of Elder T. S. Dalton, purchased

the paper from Sister Pittman at that time and Edited it until the end of 1947. It was at this time that the Advocate was set up under the management of a Board of Trustees, an arrangement which has continued until the present time. Advocate and Messenger, Incorporated, purchased the paper from Elder Dalton and Elder Albert F. Sudduth was appointed editor; Elders C. W. Miller and Leonard S. Dove, Associates. The original Board of Trustees consisted of Brethren O. F. Carpenter, President, Vernon Shaffer, Vice President, Raymond Lee and Carroll Shuler. The last two of these still serve on the Board. Brother Neal Dickens served as the first Secretary-Treasurer. Elder William G. Fletcher served as Editor from September 1956 through May, 1966, and Elder William T. Daily served in that position from then until failing health necessitated his recent retirement.

An incidental circumstance which the younger readers might consider odd or unusual is that around 1915 and possibly in other years also there was an arrangement between the Editor's of Zion's Advocate and McCall's Magazine whereby both magazines could be obtained for one year for a combined total of one dollar and twenty-five cents. I pass along this little piece of information because of the fact that the chances for such an arrangement in our day are so humorously remote.

Those Elders who have served A and M as Associate Editors also comprise quite an impressive company. This list includes such men as J. H. Oliphant, Sylvester Hassell, T. S. Dalton, John H. Booton, S. A. Thompson, Lee Hanks, A. L. Harrison, J. A. Monsees, Earl Daily, J. Harvey Daily, T. L. Webb, Sr., C. W. Miller, and many others space will not allow us to mention. These men contributed greatly to making A and M a welcome visitor in the homes of thousands of the dearest people who ever graced the earth. The present staff shall continue to strive to make it a help and encouragement to God's people into whose hands it falls. They have

not found a better way than that of their father's, but are still earnestly contending for the same precious truths and timeless principles which were advocated by the previous supporters of the Advocate.

Worldly men rush to and fro around us with their heads in the clouds and their hearts in the gutter and what association our timely state requires us to have with them is a burden to us, but by faith we are able to make a proper assessment of their doings and see that God oversees and, if He pleases, overrules the schemes and plans of men. There is much occurring in our country which we know to be displeasing to God and evidence of this displeasure abounds on every hand. But this is the customary course of men and we are assured that "evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving, and being deceived." However, regardless of what may be the way of the world around us we are exhorted to continue in the things which we have learned and been assured of, knowing of whom we have learned them (II Tim 3:13,14).

Experience teaches me that our religious periodicals are a helpful means by which a child of God may grow in the knowledge of the truth. Many precious mysteries have been unveiled to me through the spiritual writings of the servants of God. If it will do us good to hear such men express themselves from the pulpit why will it not also do us good for them to express themselves to us with pen and ink? Our church papers are not designed to take the place of the study of the Bible but rather to assist in it, promote it, and encourage it. To this end we ask an interest in your continued prayers that for another year and in the years to come we may be blessed to provide good, sound, nourishing, and instructive reading in the pages of the A and M. We hope and pray that we shall have the whole-hearted support of our readers and that they will consider it worthy of sharing with others by helping us to obtain new subscriptions. We shall also deeply appreciate any contributions toward sending it to those who are unable to pay.

May the coming year be so ordered of the Lord that its demise will find us enjoying more intimate communion with Him than when it began. Remember, if we are not rich toward God we are paupers.

GREETINGS FROM AN OLD FRIEND IN THIS NEW YEAR

Dear readers of the Advocate and Messenger, please retain me in your hearts as one of your number, and allow me to address you through the love of Christ. If I know my heart, as I hope I do, I can address you in this way without doing any injustice to His cause for I am convinced that the desire is not of the flesh. Since of an early age when my father began to edit the Zion's Advocate, I have had an interest in this publication; this was in June 1898 and it has seemed to grow on me. May I address you now on the subject of: Getting to know God

My father was considered to be a very good teacher, both in public schools and as a minister of the gospel. All nine of his children became members of the Primitive Baptist Church, (there were ten of them born to our family, but only nine were raised to adult-hood, Earl's twin sister, Pearl, died in infancy before the birth of my brother Lemuel and I.) Beside tending a small amount of farm ground, father's early occupation was only in teaching school and preaching the gospel that he loved so well; telling of Jesus and His love of sinners, not because they were sinners, but in spite of their sins; for we read that, "while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." As long as we were in this con-

dition, we were without hope of eternal salvation.

But father was comforted with the thought found in Acts 2:39, "For the promise is unto you, and to your children and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call." He realized that it was not in his power to teach them to know God, even as much as he loved them. However all of his children died as members of the dear old church, in good standing, leaving only me, the least of them, and the writer of this little message.

BLIND FROM BIRTH

"And as Jesus passed by, he saw a man which was blind from his birth. And his disciples asked him, saying, Master, who did sin, this man, or his parents, that he was born blind? Jesus answered, Neither hath this man sinned, nor his parents: but that the works of God should be made manifest in him" (John 9:1-3).

Beloved of God, we know that all mankind are sinners. "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God; Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:23-24). "Wherefore, as by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned" (Rom. 5: 12).

In the case of the blind man, there is no doubt that he was a sinner by nature even as others, but he was a type and subject of God's mercy and grace bestowed upon whom He will. His blindness did not come from his sins nor of his parents that he should be stricken blind, but in him the glory of God was made manifest. Much of this is a lesson to show the power of God and to glorify Our Father in Heaven, and to

prove how a poor sinner can glory in the Lord even in affliction.

"If I must needs glory, I will glory of the things which concern mine infirmities" (II Cor. 11:30). Paul gives an example and a great testimony when the Lord said unto him, "My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong" (II Cor. 12:9-10).

Let it be firmly known, as the Bible teaches, that Jesus came down from Heaven, not to do His own will, but the will of Him that sent Him. "And this is the Father's will which hath sent me, that of all which he hath given me I should lose nothing, but should raise it up again at the last day" (John 6: 39). He also said, "No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him: and I will raise him up at the last day" (John 6:44).

There is no doubt in our mind that this same Jesus not only opened the eyes of the blind man, but also gave him spiritual eyes. In fear of God in his heart he could cry out: "One thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see." This poor sinner became a teachable subject. He couldn't rejoice in the fact that he was a sinner; but could greatly rejoice in knowing that Jesus came to save poor lost and ruined sinners.

THE HAND OF PROVIDENCE

Article One

But when we really stop to think of providence we must consider it an act of providing not only for humanity but for all things on earth and in heaven, and this being by the hand of providence, or the hand of God. Therefore we should be careful how we use the phrase "providentially hindered."

Many times we have been providentially delivered. We have come through many things and places in which we had no power to deliver ourselves. Even the birds, the insects, and the beasts of the forest are provided for by the hand of the Lord. We must also consider where there is providence there is purpose. "The Lord of hosts hath sworn, saying, Surely as I have thought, so shall it come to pass; and as I have purposed, so shall it stand" (Isa. 14:24). "To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven" (Eccl. 3:1). God never has depended on man to help Him bring to pass that which He has promised. Our father Abraham staggered not at the promise of God, but as Paul said of him, (Rom. 4:21) he was fully persuaded that, what God had promised, He was able also to perform.

"In hope of eternal life, which God, that cannot lie, promised before the world began" (Titus 1:2). Seeing that God made this promise and we cannot doubt His ability to bring to pass whatsoever he has promised, we can safely rest in the fact that God made provision for us when as yet there was none of us on the earth. His purpose for this is that He loved us with an everlasting love, therefore with love and kindness He has drawn us out of the darkness of nature that He might be glorified on earth and that we might be recon-

ciled to Him through the death of His Son and rejoice in His providence.

"And all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation" (II Cor. 5:18). Seeing He has provided for us out of His book of remembrance how happy we should be, not only in life but even in the hour of death. David said, "Thine eyes did see my substance, yet being unperfect; and in thy book all my members were written, which in continuance were fashioned, when as yet there was none of them" (Psalm 139:16). He knew he had nothing to do with providing these things. We also can plainly see this took place before David's advent into the world. What wonderful joy this brought to David in his day, and when it pleases God to make it known to us we rejoice just as David did. Though we are so imperfect yet in His everlasting love we are forever embraced, shielded from destruction by the hand of providence.

"For the Lord's portion is his people; Jacob is the lot of his inheritance" (Deut. 32:9). All the members of God's family are embraced in this lot or number, matters not what nation they may belong to from a natural standpoint, for He has redeemed them out of every kindred and tongue and people (Rev. 5:9). In Deut. 32:10 we see that God found Jacob in a desert land. This was not by chance, neither was God ignorant of where Jacob was before this time. As we have already seen, Jacob is the lot of God's inheritance and in II Tim. 2:19 we read that the foundation of God standeth sure, having this seal, the Lord knoweth them that are His. Therefore He knew beforehand where Jacob was, but He found him in a desert land or in this state and condition. I went to the place where I worked for 35 years. I knew where it was, but each time I went I found it there. So it is that God's people are found in the world and in a worldly state. When this happens the world becomes a desert land to them. They feel to be deserted and justly so because of their sins.

Where they once stood in a land of plenty and was therewith content they now stand in need of something a desert land and a waste howling wilderness cannot give. The things of the world that once had been a pleasure and music to their ears now become a wilderness filled with the howling sounds of the sinful things that so thickly surround them.

But in Deut. 32:10 we see that the Lord led Jacob about; He instructed him; He kept him as the apple of His eye. The Lord led Jacob to the mountain of God. It was there Jacob could truly rejoice and know God was his keeper. Had it not been for the hand of providence to lead Jacob into spiritual light he would have remained in the world and been satisfied with it. God has provided this mountain of God, or kingdom, for his people. He also provided a people for this kingdom, and some day each one of them will come to Christ, (John 6:37). Not only will they come to Him but they will never be cast out of His sight or care, and some day they will be lifted above the sorrows of this world to sing everlasting praises around the throne of God. What wonderful love God has for His people to provide such glory for them here and hereafter.

The glorious promises of God are sure and we, being the spiritual offspring of Jacob, are also among the lot of God's inheritance. NATIONAL PROBLEMS AND THE CURE

We live in times unparalleled in human history and I often wonder how those must feel about the future who have no hope in Christ and no apprehension of His greatness, of His eternal deity and Sonship, of redemption through His blood and justification by His righteousness: who know nothing of the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His sufferings and of conformity to His death. All around us we see "men's hearts failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth." Mental institutions all over the world are filled with people whose fears were too great for their minds to continue facing and accepting them. Surely if we had nothing better to occupy our minds than the bleak and dreary scenes presented to us by world conditions and national problems we soon would join those whose minds have blocked out these realities.

One high-ranking official recently expressed his belief that "today we face a Soviet threat far greater than any other threat this country has ever faced in its 200 years of existence." I agree that Russia has surpassed us in some instances in military power and that her greatest desire is to destroy us. I also agree that at the present rate it may not be too long before she outnumbers us five to one in military hardware. But this one thing I steadfastly maintain; no enemy, regardless of how strong, militarily or otherwise can destroy this nation so long as God is pleased to preserve it, and just as long as there is a sufficient number of righteous souls within its borders He will continue to be pleased to preserve it.

Basically then I would say *ungodliness* represents the greatest threat to our society. Many sins abound in America and one of the most common is greed. The masses call for more and more Federal handouts and candidates who promise the greatest prosperity are the ones who get elected. The people demand more and more government services which re-

quires more and more taxation.

I wonder how many of our readers are aware of the rate at which government spending is increasing. It took the United States 173 years to reach the \$100 billion a year level. But then it took us only nine years to double that. Then in only four years we were spending \$300 billion annually, and it didn't level off. Only two years later it had reached \$400 billion! Is there any difference between an individual spending more than his income and a group of men spending more than their income? Obviously not. Such a practice, if persisted in, must eventually end in insolvency. Some supposedly intelligent economists say we cannot have another depression, while others say there is no way out. Things are in too big a mess to ever straighten them out. Neither of these views are necessarily correct. God still rules and reigns in heaven. The promise in II Chron. 7:14 still stands. If God's people, who are called by His name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek His face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will He hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land. We are not going to get any help in this from the world. This is something those who are called by God's name must do if it is ever done.

If the above actions on the part of the followers of Christ will heal our land, then it is obvious a lack of such things got us in the condition we are in. May the Lord give our people a spiritual revival and awakening which will cause us to see, feel, and confess our back-slidings; a renewal and restoration of soul that will fill our hearts with such a warmth, tenderness, love, and concern for our brethren that we will always be striving for the things which make for peace and joy and unity among the churches. Just as poor leadership has contributed much to national disunity and decay so also has poor leadership often been the cause of problems in the churches. Little things have often reached far greater proportions than they should have reached because of

a lack of proper labor and leadership. Such things have always been the case and what I say here will not change it, but there is One Who *can* change it, and He will if we heed what is advised above in II Chronicles.
