He was ordained in about 1960 and served several churches in central Arkansas --most notably his home church, Shiloh of Conway, Arkansas. Elder Isaacs was always anxious to serve the Lord and his church wherever his lot was cast. He was content to labor in the cause in small churches and did not seek the acclaim of the world.

ELDER B. ISAACS



WRITTEN BY ELDER MARK GREEN: Elder Isaacs was born February 10, 1894, in Illinois, but grew to manhood in Arkansas. He passed away January 10, 1991, preaching up until very near the end of his long and useful life. Having been convinced of the truth of the doctrines of grace by his personal study and reading some issues of The Primitive Baptist, he joined Hopewell Primitive Baptist Church the first time he attended a service of any Old Baptist Church, which was in August of 1922. He was received with tears and rejoicing. He began preaching almost immediately, his first text being 2 Tim. 1:9, and was ordained on July 4, 1926.

Elders Jacob Sandage and F. M. Russell were in the presbytery.

In 1947, he moved to Logan County, Arkansas, where he lived the remainder of his life. He pastored about 15 different churches in his ministry, including, among others, Salem, Bethlehem, Hopewell, Zion's Rest, Reveille, Little Vine, New Prospect, Shiloh, Little Flock and Friendship Churches.

Elder Isaacs was widely respected as an able student of the scriptures and Bible expositor. He was a very deliberate and forceful preacher, and his memory was such that he seldom carried a Bible with him when preaching, but quoted at length passages to which he referred. He named Elders John R. Daily, Sylvester Hassell, and especially C. H. Cayce as men whose writings influenced him greatly. He wrote Elder Hassell before he joined the church and told him that he had concluded that the Primitive Baptists were the church and had the truth, and if he could help him in his study in any way he would appreciate it. Elder Hassell sent him a stack of books and pamphlets, which he treasured. He held three public debates, one each with a Campbellite, Freewill Baptist and Missionary Baptist preacher.

Elder Isaacs' influence will be felt in western Arkansas for many years to come. His plain, unhurried style of speaking made him easy to understand and the direct manner in which he approached the doctrines of the church served to leave the congregations he pastored well established in the truth. At the end of his sermons he would give his wishes for the well being of the congregation, ending with the phrase, "This is the prayer of your poor,

unworthy servant." His demeanor was one of dignity, yet he was very approachable, with a ready smile and kind words. It was his habit to seek out each person in the congregation and shake hands with him, even if he had missed him in the formal hand-shake after the service. His personal conduct was above reproach, and he insisted upon good discipline in the church.

ELDER JAMES ISAACS



The grandson of Elder B. Isaacs, Bro James Isaacs was born June 23, 1951, in Paris, Arkansas. He united with Reveille Church near Magazine, Arkansas, in June of 1969 and was baptized by his grandfather. He was ordained to the full work of the ministry in November 1975 and is presently serving Reveille and Little Vine Churches in Logan County, Arkansas, as pastor. He has served several other churches in central and western Arkansas and they have appreciated his capable ministry.
