Ecclesiastes 1:9, **“The thing that hath been, it is that which shall be; and that which is done is that which shall be done: and there is no new thing under the sun.”**

...12/30/2014

Proverbs 10:19, **“In the multitude of words there wanteth not sin: but he that refraineth his lips is wise.”**

The wise man Solomon spoke often of the contrast between the wise and the foolish. You cannot compare God to Satan as God has no equal, neither can you compare the wise to the foolish in this context. However, you can declare the contrast between the two. For example: God is sinless - Satan is sin. A wise man cares for the things of God - A foolish man cares not. In Proverbs 10:19, Solomon draws a contrast between a foolish man who talks just to hear himself talk, also known as **“profane and vain babblings”** (II Timothy 2:16), and a wise man who chooses his words cautiously (wisely). Solomon refers to this again in Proverbs 16:23 when he said, **“The heart of the wise teacheth his mouth, and addeth learning to his lips.”**

The Apostle Paul teaches a similar lesson to the church at Corinth when he told them, **“Yet in the church I had rather speak five words with my understanding, that by my voice I might teach others also, than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue”** (I Corinthians 14:19). To speak with understanding is to speak wisely. One cannot speak wisely if they are mad, upset, vengeful, or any number of other conditions which would prohibit them from thinking straight. Have you ever noticed how someone who is really mad can string out a long line of bad words and sentences which make no sense? However, consider Jesus when He, in the midst of a feast, went up into the temple and taught the doctrine which God had sent Him to teach. Jesus taught those nearby with ultimate wisdom. So much so that the officers which came answered the Pharisees concerning Christ, **“Never man spake like this man”** (John 7:46). Paul, remember, spake the same way in I Corinthians 2:4, **“And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words”** (vain or in multiplicity) **“of man’s wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power.”** Let us speak as Solomon spoke (by the leadership of the Spirit) and as Christ speaks to us in Matthew 5:37, **“But let your communication be, Yea, yea; Nay, nay: for whatsoever is more than these cometh of evil.”** Now we are truly reminded where Solomon got his words of wisdom. Think About IT!

... 12-29-14

Matthew 26:41, **“Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.”**

We often find ourselves in a weakened condition due to any number of reasons, as some are physical (work related, stress related, or due to things beyond our control) while others are of a spiritual weakness. The answer is simple though actually obtaining the answer is not - We All Need Rest! Our bodies tend to give out after awhile due to any number of contributing factors.

Spiritually, our bodies give out as well, and like our natural bodies, we need rest to refresh ourselves. In the text found in Matthew 26:41, it is speaking of the spiritual condition we find ourselves in at any given time. The flesh (desire, zeal, want to, etc.) grows weak at times and thus our spiritual welfare suffers. We all need our family and friends to help us bear through these weakened times as we also should help others when we see them facing the same condition. Paul alludes to this in Romans 15:1 as he says, **“We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves.”** We can help our loved ones (natural and church families) by watching out and praying for them. Even then, it is difficult to solve all of the issues or problems they suffer, not counting what we individually face. There is good news coming for all of God’s children when we consider His promises. We are told by Paul, concerning our natural bodies, that **“it is sown in dishonour; it is raised in glory: it is sown in weakness; it is raised in power:...”** (I Corinthians 15:43). So, regardless if your body is weak in natural strength, or weak in spiritual vitality, or both; there will come a time when the Lord will cure all of our ills. He (Christ) is coming back for His children to take us to a place where there will be no more weakness of any kind! What a wonderful promise we have. And, what confidence it gives us in knowing what Paul knew and shared with Timothy, **“for I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day”** (II Timothy 1:12). “Watch and pray” everyday and see the Lord come in His power as He strengthens the weak and gives rest to our weary souls while we live on this earth, with the promise also of His rest eternally. ... 12-24-14

The story of the birth of Jesus Christ our Saviour, begins in Matthew 1:1 and proceeds through Matthew 2:23. It is a story of the Son of God being born on this earth of a virgin named Mary and that He would **“save His people from their sins”** (Matt. 1:21). No one but God knows the exact date that He was born. It doesn’t really matter for me to know the date, only that He was born, lived a

sinless, perfect life, and accomplished the work which the Father sent Him to do, **“save His people from their sins”**. It is a shame that some who profess to be “christians” do not believe that Jesus did exactly what He was sent here to do, **“save His people from their sins”**. When Christ hung upon the Cross of Calvary and declared **“It is finished” (John 19:30)**, He was declaring the He had saved **“His people from their sins”** exactly as God the Father in Heaven had willed. There are many in past history of which we could not rely on them doing what they said they would do. Jesus was NOT one of them. He did exactly what He was sent to do, **“save His people from their sins.”** Notice the words of Christ in John 6:37-39, **“All that the Father giveth me shall come to me; and him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out. For I came down from heaven, not to do mine own will, but the will of him that sent me. And this is the Father’s will which hath sent me, that of all which he hath given me I should lose nothing, but should raise it up again at the last day.”** By now you get the idea. You can believe what Jesus says because if you have seen Him, you have seen the Father. If He has born you again of His Spirit and taken up His abode in your heart, then by an eye of faith you have seen Him who has saved **“His people from their sins.”** May we be as Simon Peter when he answered the Lord whether they too would go away due to what some considered as a hard saying. **“Lord, to whom shall we go? thou hast the word of eternal life” (John 6:68)**. I pray you will draw comfort from these words every day of your life. As for now, may your Christmas season be merry and bright. Think About IT!

... 12-23-14

Proverbs 22:24, **“Make no friendship with an angry man; and with a furious man thou shalt not go: Lest thou learn his ways, and get a snare to thy soul.”**

Society has changed since I was a boy raised up in the country. There was a church key which not only would fit the doors of our home, but probably over half in the community where we lived. There was an old saying that went like this, *“Locked doors are to keep the honest man out.”* I always had a problem with that saying because I was raised to believe that an honest man would not go into your home (for the wrong reason) anyway unless they were invited.

Consider your home as being yourself. When we invite someone to be our friend, or when we spend time with them, it’s inviting them into our lives. If you invite a thief into your home, most of us would agree, you are asking for trouble. The same goes for those with whom we make friendships. Today it is dangerous enough, but to go out of our way to invite trouble is not wise. There is no telling what an angry man will do. But, a furious man is worse. Proverbs 22:24 has Solomon warning us

not to be around the angry, nor go anywhere with those that cannot control themselves and are furious for any reason. The end result will not be good. Solomon said, **“Lest thou learn his ways, and get a snare to thy soul.”** A snare binds up whatever it has entrapped. Born again children of God have been **“...made free from sin”** (Romans 6:18, 22) and do not need to go back under any kind of bondage again. The Lord has given us the knowledge we need to rightfully discern between which people we should be around lest we learn their ways (get caught up) and suffer the consequences. Our bodies are **“...the temple of the living God”** (II Corinthians 6:16), therefore the Lord and His children are to be the ones we dwell and walk with. They are the ones we should invite into our house (presence), not the angry and furious of this world who can not or will not control their actions. Why not purchase (without money) the best security system there is (the presence of the Lord), for He has promised to take care of us. Christ Jesus has released us from the snare of **“the law of sin and death”** (Romans 8:2) and is our **KEY** to protect us. Open your house (your self) to the environment of righteousness, not to that which ensnares. Think About IT!

... 12-19-14

Nehemiah 8:10, **“Then he said unto them, Go your way, eat the fat, and drink the sweet, and send portions unto them for whom nothing is prepared: for this day is holy unto the LORD: neither be ye sorry; for the joy of the LORD is your strength.”**

It never fails! When any holiday comes, our strength seems to go. Preparations are to be made, cooking to be done, extra house fixings, and all that goes with having your loved ones join you for the Holidays. School is about to be out for a couple of weeks, traffic is picking up at a rapid pace, and there are extra cars, big trucks, and people driving them that are being manufactured somewhere in triple overtime. These are the days when we all need extra strength. Back in the day of Nehemiah, He told the people to **“Go your way, eat the fat, and drink the sweet.”** They were to have a feast, much like many will have during the Christmas Holidays. He reminded them however, to not forget those who had nothing. Why? **“For this day is holy unto the LORD.”** The people had been listening to the words of the law being read unto them and it had caused them to mourn and to weep (Nehemiah 8:9). The reading of the law and its requirements had brought strong emotions on them which they seemingly were not able to bear. Nehemiah admonished them to not be sorry of what they had heard, but dwell on

the fact that the Lord was their strength and would be with them in the days to come. We need this assurance today, in our lives. We need to be reminded that no matter how hectic our lives become at any time of the year, the Lord is the one to turn to for strength and where we will find joy. Keep that in mind as you fight the traffic and while you entertain family. The Lord is our strength, and with His help, we can enjoy our families and the holidays without undo stress. Bring it on, we are so looking forward to being with those we love during the next several weeks. And, that goes for our church family as well. May the joy of the Lord be with you and strengthen you is our prayer. Think About It!

... 12-18-14

Ecclesiastes 9:18, **“Wisdom is better than weapons of war: but one sinner destroyeth much good.”**

Hopefully, no one reading this will argue with the first part of this statement. As the wise man Solomon sought wisdom, so should we. However, we need to do a better job with what wisdom we possess. **“One sinner destroyeth much good”** is a profound statement we all can readily understand and have seen it’s effects many times. Statements like *“one rotten apple will spoil the hold barrel”* come to mind as it doesn’t take very much evilness, unkind words, sharp tongues, or knives in the back, to destroy friendships, families, and even churches. Freedom of speech does not give anyone the right to speak their mind at the expense of others. Stop before you speak and consider the consequences by using a little wisdom in your words and actions. David spoke of this in Psalm 52:2, **“The tongue deviseth mischiefs; like a sharp razor, working deceitfully.”** The individual who just speaks without considering the consequences is foolish in their actions. How do we combat this from happening to us? How do we make sure we use wisdom before hurting others with our words and actions? Consider James 1:5 for the answer, **“If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given to him.”** Don’t be one that **“destroyeth much good”**, but rather be one that asks God for wisdom and then uses it liberally. Think About It!

... 12-17-14

Proverbs 28:13, **“He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy.”**

As a child, many of us may have sought out others to blame for our wrong doings in order to hide (cover up) our mischievous acts (sins). Solomon said that it would not benefit us to hide our evil doings or those things we may classify as just mistakes. Such things are embarrassing to children of God who have to battle the two natures which are within us, that of the natural (fleshly) nature and that of the spiritual nature. The opposite of “covereth” is “uncovereth”, or to not hide and be open about our mistakes and sins. Then, once we have changed our thinking, we need to confess our faults (sins) to God. But, the Lord did not stop there. Solomon’s teaching goes further as led by the Spirit of God to speak of our need to forsake our past ways and the Lord **“shall have mercy”** on us. Paul admonishes the brethren by saying **“Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord”** (Acts 3:19). Conversion is not being born again. Conversion is a changing **“forsaking”** of our ways. Therefore, we need to repent (confess and forsake) as oft as need be and a **“refreshing”** time will come with us being able to once again feel **“the presence of the Lord”** strongly in our lives. This is indeed what we all need to seek diligently for; and that is the pleasing of the Lord. Why not go to the Lord today and confess your sins, knowing that **“If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness”** (I John 1:9). Think About It!

... 12-16-14

Proverbs 26:4, **“Answer not a fool according to his folly, lest thou also be like unto him.”**

Proverbs 26:5, **“Answer a fool according to his folly, lest he be wise in his own conceit.”**

The wise man Solomon spoke of not answering and then of answering the folly of a foolish man (or woman). These two verses are neat (really good) in what they teach of how we are to deal with the foolish. At first glance, Solomon would appear to be contradicting himself - **“Answer not”** then **“Answer”**. However, that is not the case. The underlying meaning is of how we are to respond. We can fall into the same ditch with him if we answer him according to the same manner of which he has foolishly spoken, or we can answer him with godly wisdom and it will be a snare unto him. Peter alludes to how our conversation should be in I Peter 1:15, **“But as he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation;...”** And as Paul said, **“For our conversation is in heaven; from whence also we look for the Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ.”** The words coming forth from our mouth should always be tempered with kindness,

thoughtfulness, truthfulness, and godliness. Not only should this be true when we are around the Saints of God, but also when we are around the foolish. It is so easy to be *'caught up'* with like speech when we are surrounded by those who do not think and act godly on a regular basis. It is at these times when we need to lean on the Lord for His help. In II Peter 3:3, Peter speaks of the coming **“in the last days scoffers, walking after their own lusts.”** More than likely these **“scoffers”** will have vain questions and foolish words because they themselves are fools. Peter goes on to say further down in verse 11 how **“ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness.”** Be not foolish yourself, keep your conversation godly and thus answer a fool in a manner that it will dissolve the situation, and at most, that you not displease the Lord. Think About It!

... 12-15-14

Romans 12:19, “Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord.”

Paul breaks from his usual beginnings of admonition found in chapter 12 of Romans by saying “Dearly beloved” before he mentions anything else. Now that he has their attention, Paul lays forth an important “proverb like” sentence on not taking revenge on others for wrongs they have done unto you. The first point is to “avenge not yourselves”. It is our fleshly nature to want and seek revenge on those who “despitefully use” us. In Matthew 5:44, the Lord instructs us to “pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you;...” Luke adds the words “Bless them that curse you” in Luke 6:28. We all know how hard this is for any of us to do, so, Paul began this admonition by reminding them that he loved them “Dearly”.

Notice now the next part of this statement which says “rather give place unto wrath:...” Don’t think for a moment that this means the Lord would be pleased for you to discharge wrath upon the wrongdoers when Paul had just said we were not to avenge ourselves. The answer is found in the ending of this sentence - “Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord.” The Apostle is telling us that by not avenging ourselves, that it gives place for the wrath of God to come upon the wrongdoers as He (God) executes judgment (vengeance) upon them. Speaking of the Lord, Moses said, “He is the Rock, his work is perfect: for all his ways are judgment: a God of truth and without iniquity, just and right is he” (Deuteronomy 32:4). You see, we would only mess it up! God knows what, where and when it is best to issue His wrath upon the wicked. It is far better that ye “avenge not yourselves”. Think About It!

The words of Brother Jeff are so true. We don't normally think about our natural health or spiritual health, or lack thereof, until we get older. Surely there are a number of exceptions of which I am thankful. It is so encouraging to see the young, teenagers and the like, having a zeal of God and exercising it in their efforts to come to church, help lead singing, showing kindness and respectfulness to their elders, and their godly countenance. Encourage the young of your church and family. Remind them that their blessings come from Jesus Christ our Lord. One time, there were some who **“brought young children to him, that he should touch them: and his disciples rebuked those that brought them”** (Mark 10:13). There is nothing better in this vain world than to be lovingly touched by the very hand of God himself; the same hand which had blessed and healed the lame and the blind and even had raised the dead. And yet, **“His disciples rebuked those that brought them.”** Jesus himself was **“much displeased”** by their actions and told them, **“Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God”** (Mark 10:14). We are all as **“little children”** in the church of the Lord Jesus Christ and have need of His loving touch and healing hand. Many of us may have failed to teach our children about the importance of good natural health and also of good Spiritual Health when they were young. Life (both natural and spiritual) is indeed precious. Hold on to it and embrace it, knowing there are better days coming for all of God's children. Think About It!

... 12-9-14

Romans 12:17, *“Recompense to no man evil for evil. Provide things honest in the sight of all men.”*

It is so very easy to want to retaliate against those who would or do bad things to us. Grudges can become common place in our character if we allow the evil spirit of revenge to cling to our daily attitude. Paul says, “Recompense to no man evil for evil.” This is so very hard to do according to our fleshly nature. It

creeps into our society, our families, and even our churches if we are not careful. Only by the strengthening of our spiritual nature by constant contact with the encouraging words of our Lord, are we able to, as found in Romans 8:13, “mortify the deeds of the body (flesh).” When a child of God is born of the Spirit of God, they then have two natures; one they already have of the flesh, and then their new nature of God’s Spirit which takes up its abode within us at the new birth. These two natures constantly battle against each other. Paul even said it was a law, “When I would do good, evil is present with me” (Romans 7:21). So, what we find is one of our natures wants to “Recompense” (retaliate) with evil given for evil received, which is reverse from what we call the Golden Rule (Luke 6:31 - “And as ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise”). We all need to work on this retaliation attitude. Recent news broadcast bears out an ever increasing number of people who have this evil attitude about them. God’s people should never allow their fleshly nature to over-rule their spiritual nature. Paul finishes Romans 12:17 by telling them to “Provide things honest in the sight of all men.” Lying is another bad aspect of our fleshly nature which should never be allowed to raise its ugly head. To “Provide things honest” is to not only tell the truth at all times, but to suppress anything which is against the truth. This is not only in our daily lives, but we are to live the truth of God’s word. Just believing it is not enough! We are to “be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only” (James 1:22) of the truths of the gospel. Some people seem to want to live by one standard (do what brings only immediate pleasure) and yet die by another standard (by the grace and mercy of God). Be willing to stand up for the truth of God’s word and also be able to defend it, not by recompensing evil for evil, but by sharing the good news of Jesus Christ and Him crucified and a resurrected Saviour. This is providing “things honest.” Think About It!

... 12-8-14

Romans 12:16, **“Be of the same mind one toward another. Mind not high things, but condescend to men of low estate. Be not wise in your own conceits.”**

“Be of the same mind” is about as plain a language that can be stated. To the Philippian brethren, Paul in 2:2 said, **“Fulfil ye my joy, that ye be likeminded, having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind.”** There are other references which could be quoted, but the question is *“What mind are we to be likeminded about?”* Simply put, we are to have the mind of Christ. Next question is *“how do we have this mind of Christ.”* I Corinthians 2:16 tells us, **“For who hath known the mind of the Lord, that he may instruct him? but we have the**

mind of Christ.” Paul is telling these brethren that he and the other disciples of Christ possessed this **“mind of Christ”** because of their faith in His truths. They had the **“mind of Christ”** because the Lord had born them again of His Spirit. The “New Birth” instills within us the ability to know and learn more about our Lord. Once we have this “new nature” given by God’s Spirit, then we are to **“put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof”** (Romans 13:14). God’s people are to be **“like minded”** toward one another concerning the truths of God’s word, giving Him all the praise, honor and glory which He alone is due.

Paul then says, **“Mind not high things”**. There are those going about who profess to have all the answers. Their “vain babblings”, accord to II Timothy 2:26, will only **“increase unto more ungodliness.”** To **“condescend to men of low estate”** means to be as the publican who, **“standing afar off, would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast, saying, God be merciful to me a sinner”** (Luke 18:13). Then, we read why we are to **“mind not high things”**. Luke 18:14 says, **“...for every one that exalteth himself shall be abased; and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted.”**

So, let us strive to not be wise in our own conceits, but rather **“put on the Lord Jesus Christ”** and be of one accord with those who are **“likeminded”**. Think About It!

... 12-5-14

Romans 12:15, **“Rejoice with them that do rejoice, and weep with them that weep.”**

What comes to your mind when you see the word **“rejoice”**? As a christian, your mind should be centered on rejoicing in the blessings and promises of God. However, this is not true for everyone in the world around us. Many think of *“going out on the town for a high old time”* when they see the word **“rejoice”**. The biblical usage for disciples of Christ is far removed from the sinful, fleshly usage of those whose minds are centered on satisfying the sins of the flesh.

When Paul used it in Romans 12:15, he was referring to God fearing followers of Christ rejoicing when others (specially the establishment of new churches) heard the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ and became believers. It was a time to rejoice when those who had embraced the teachings of the old law were converted to the truth concerning Jesus being the Son of God and being the Messiah (saviour). In addition, there was much rejoicing when those who had been regarded as **“unclean”** were found to be **“clean”** when Jesus announced their inclusion in the preaching and receiving of the gospel. They now had much to rejoice about.

To **“weep with them that weep”** is a profound statement concerning compassion, caring, and kindness on the part of a child of God who professes to be a follower of Christ. Jesus proclaimed **“Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted”** in Matthew 5:4. To weep with those who are weeping doesn't mean just to stand near by and join them in crying. It is far more reaching than that. It embraces the thought of sharing with them comforting words of God's mercy and grace so they may receive strength and encouragement. Then the weeping becomes more than just crying, it is a heart felt compassion which is a godly attribute we all are to possess. The Lord said **“for they shall be comforted”**. What better news can you share as you **“weep with them that weep”**. May God bless us to learn “deeper meanings” found in God's word. **“And again he saith, Rejoice, ye Gentiles, with his people”** (Romans 15:10). Think About It!

... 12-4-14

Romans 12:14, **“Bless them which persecute you; bless, and curse not.”**

Many of the verses in chapter 12 of the book of Romans deal with instructions from the Apostle Paul on how they were to live their lives and how to treat others, even those who were not saints. One of the hardest things for any of us to do is to pray for our enemies. Notice what the Lord said in Luke 6:28, **“Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you.”** Oh, Goodness! We must all admit how difficult this is if we are in the flesh. Only by the aid of God's spiritual presence can we pray for those who speak or do harmful actions against us. The rendering in Matthew 5:44 goes even further, **“But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you;...”** Here we find instruction to not only **“do good to them”** but to also **“Love”** them. Rightly dividing the Word of God, this **“Love”** is not to be thought of as the same way we love our companion, our children, or our love for God. But rather this **“Love”** means to not seek their harm, not wish bad things upon them, or attempt revenge or retaliation of any kind. It is always better to leave such things to God (not easy for us to do though). He can and will fight your battles for you. Just a few verses further down in Romans 12 Paul states, **“Therefore if thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink: for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head.”**

Notice again the usage of “bless” two times in Romans 12:14. Why? Would not the first “Bless them” have been enough? The inspired Word of God never words any thing without a reason. To “bless” someone is to do the same as is spoken of in Matthew 5:44 and Luke 6:28, which also includes giving food and drink to them as

shown in Romans 12:20. Look how Paul finishes chapter 12 in verse 21, “Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good.” Maybe it would be good for us to do as one song says, *“Take your burden to the Lord and leave it there.”* **Think About It!**

... 12-2-14

Romans 12:12, “Rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer;...”

The Apostle Paul, in his instruction and admonition to the Roman brethren, continues in verse 12 with three vitally important statements which every child of God needs to take to heart. First, he reminds them to rejoice; and not only rejoice, but do so in hope. He told them in Romans 5:5 that, **“hope maketh not ashamed; because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us.”** When we stop and realize that our hope is based on nothing less than Jesus Christ and His righteousness, then we have much to rejoice about. It is His imputed righteousness which makes us worthy of abiding one day in Paradise with our Lord and Saviour. Knowing what Christ has done for us in saving us from our sins by the shedding of His blood upon the cross of Calvary is the reason that our Hope is so strong.

Once we realize the deliverance of God’s children, and have that assurance in our hearts that He died for us, then we can face any trial, tribulation, heartache, pain, or suffering which comes our way. Paul told the Romans in chapter 5, verse 3, that **“...we glory in tribulations also, knowing that tribulation worketh patience;...”** We have a blessed promise that Christ will be with us in every tribulation, even to the point we are made able **“to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God”** (II Corinthians 1:4). We all know it hurts to lose a loved one. However, with a strong Hope in Jesus Christ our redeemer, we can rejoice knowing our loved one is singing praises in the portals of Heaven.

Though our hope is made strong by an active faith in the mercy and grace of a loving Lord which causes us to rejoice and to be able to withstand in the evil day, we still need the strength, peace and comfort that can only come through pouring out our souls to the Lord in regular, sincere prayer. Paul knew this and admonishes the Roman church to **“pray”**. He told them in Romans 1:9 that **“without ceasing I make mention of you always in my prayers:”** He cared enough about them to pray for them. That is the highest gift anyone of us is able to give, the gift of our prayers. Then, in Romans 15:30, Paul expressed his need for their prayers - **“Now**

I beseech you, brethren for the Lord Jesus Christ's sake, and for the love of the Spirit, that ye strive together with me in your prayers to God for me;..."

To tell them that he desires their prayers is the ultimate compliment and the giving of respect.

Here in Romans 12:12, Paul was again instructing them to stay firm in their faith which would give them solid ground for their hope, causing them to rejoice, and then realize the necessity to pray for themselves and also for him and the cause of Christ. The Psalmist David, in a like time of being cast down due to tribulations said, *"Why art thou cast down, O my soul? and why art thou disquieted within me? hope thou in God: for I shall yet praise him, who is the health of my countenance, and my God."* (Psalm 42:11). Remember, because we have a hope which is based on a Saviour who was able to finish the work which God sent Him to do, we can pray fervently with the knowledge that He hears our petitions which causes us to rejoice greatly. Think About It!

... 11-3-14

Romans 14:16, **"Let not your good be evil spoken of:..."**

Context (God's intended meaning) of any scripture is highly important. In this verse it is no different. We find the Apostle Paul speaking the following in I Corinthians 10:30, **"For if I by grace be a partaker, why am I evil spoken of for that which I give thanks?"** Paul is referring to the blessings of the gospel of which he was made a partaker of and yet found himself being evil spoken of because he adhered to its teachings. He goes further and proclaims the gospel worthy of our being thankful for it. If someone speaks evil of your service to God, are you willing to endure it for Jesus' sake? Are you ready to spend and be spent for the cause of Christ? Or, are you willing to deny Him in order to avoid public ridicule? In the evil days we are living in, some are facing these hard questions concerning morality, faithfulness, discipline, and other issues which question our willingness to stand for the truths of God. In addition, consider how we react when someone questions our beliefs. If our reactions are not with longsuffering and gentleness, then our good can easily be evil spoken of and bring reproach to the cause of Christ.

In Romans 14, Paul is calling to mind the issue of eating those meats which many still believed to be unclean. We know that the Lord had already taught Peter in Acts 10:15 that **"what God hath cleansed, that call not thou common"**

(spiritually meaning the Gentiles). The religious leaders of the Jewish nation still held to certain meats as being unclean and by eating those meats they could be accused of being unclean. Reminds me of Paul saying, **“Wherefore, if meat make my brother to offend, I will eat no flesh while the world standeth, lest I make my brother to offend”** (I Corinthians 8:13). May God grant us the wisdom to know how to **“do good unto all men”** (Galatians 6:10) so there is no question or mistaking that our purposes are good and are indeed, godly. **Think about it!**

... 11-4-14

Romans 13:10, **“Love worketh no ill to his neighbour: therefore love is the fulfilling of the law.”**

No one who is a follower of Christ would deny that **“God is love”** (I John 4:8)! If we are to be true followers of Jesus Christ, we then must exercise that love which has been put in our hearts by our Saviour. When the Spirit takes up its abode in the heart of a born again Child of God, godly love comes with it. We then have the ability to love as God instructs us to do. I John 4:7 illustrates clearly this principle, **“Beloved, let us love one another: for love is of God; and every one that loveth is born of God, and knoweth God.”** How then, can some admonish others to just “love God” and “be born again” when we cannot love God until we are born again of His Spirit. Notice the wording, **“every one that loveth is born of God...”** The word **“is”** means exactly what it says (already born before loving). If you love God, that is evidence that you have already been born of the Spirit. Now, put that love into action by not doing any ill toward your neighbour. Since we are now under the Law of Grace, we then can see how the law is fulfilled by the works of Jesus Christ which we could not do for ourselves **“For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God”** (Ephesians 2:8). What is it we are to do with the love which God has instilled within us? Are we to just let it sit idle and not be used? But rather, are we to put it into action by doing righteously (doing good) unto those around us (our neighbours)? John said in 13:34, **“A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another.”** If you truly love someone for the cause of Christ, you will seek to do them NO HARM! **Think about it!**

... 11-5-14

Romans 13:11, **“And that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed.”**

The word “sleep” can mean several things as used in scripture. It can mean: 1- taking a good rest when the body is tired and needs renewing (Mark 14:37-41), 2- a state of death as when Jesus referred to Lazarus as being asleep (to Christ it was as if he was just asleep in John 11:11 and vs.14, also read Luke 8:51-53), or 3- the condition of a child of God when they are not being profitable in the cause of Christ. It is this last meaning of which Paul refers to in Romans 13:11. He was admonishing the Christians at Rome to wake up from their condition of idleness and be up and about the business of righteous living and standing up for the truth. The time was that of the gospel age, when the gospel of Jesus Christ was to be proclaimed and its truths taught and defended. We are still living in that time today and it is high time, maybe even past time in some cases, for Christians to arise and speak the words of peace, comfort, righteousness, and godly living and their importance to God’s people. Paul referred again to this type of sleep in I Thessalonians 5:6 when he admonished the church at Thessalonica by saying, **“Therefore let us not sleep, as do others; but let us watch and be sober.”** Certainly Paul is not telling them to leave off natural sleep, but rather to be diligent in following Christ as in Hebrews 11:6, **“...for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him.”** Let us do as Isaiah commanded the Israelites when he told them to, **“Shake thyself from the dust; arise, and sit down, O Jerusalem:...”** Don’t be one that has fallen asleep in your responsibility in serving God, even to the point that dust has collected upon you. At the end of verse 11, Paul reminds them that **“our salvation is nearer than when we believed.”** As we get older, this becomes more of a reality than ever before. The very thought that we are nearer now to our Eternal Salvation and being at rest in Paradise brings us much peace and comfort. Certainly, we should **Think about it!**

... 11-6-14

Romans 13:12, **“The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light.”**

In this 12th. verse, the Apostle Paul continues his admonition to the church at Rome. He has told them in verse 11 to wake up and realize that it is high time to serve the Lord for all the wonderful things concerning Salvation which he has done for us. Now, he tells them that **“the night is far spent, the day is at hand:...”** Night refers to darkness, or sinfulness, or anything time in our lives in which we

were not enjoying a close relationship with the Lord. The time under the law and all of its trappings is over and the day of Salvation **“is at hand”** (close by or near). The works of darkness under consideration embraces both the thought of one’s own works would win them a home in heaven and any unrighteousness we embrace which causes us to walk contrary to the will of God. Both of these concepts will lead one to darkness, away from the felt presence of God. To **“cast off the works of darkness”** takes some serious help, that of putting on the **“armour of light.”** Paul told the Ephesian church to **“Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil.”** Then, in Ephesians 6:13, he adds **“that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand.”** Think about it!

... 11-10-14

Romans 13:13, **“Let us walk honestly, as in the day; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying.”**

To walk honestly means to be able to walk with full disclosure; laying open our inner selves to the point that we declare our depravity while we acknowledge that our righteousness is imputed by Christ. We are to do this before others **“as in the day”**, meaning in the presence of godly people and while we walk godly before all men (and women). To walk in the night refers to walking in ungodly ways and among those who are walking contrary to the teachings of Jesus Christ. For example: if we are found in places where sin abounds, then they would be termed as “places of darkness” (void of the felt presence of God). Paul alludes to this in I Thessalonians 5:5 when he said, **“Ye are all the children of light, and the children of the day: we are not of the night, nor of darkness.”** Notice the next part of Romans 13:13, **“not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness...”** He explains this so well that it becomes plain as day and night what he means. We are to stay away from ungodly places and from being around ungodly people and their acts of rioting, drunkenness, chambering, and wantonness. If you don’t know what these four things mean, then its homework time with your dictionary. Paul then concludes this 13th verse by saying we are not to walk **“in strife and envying.”** We should be seeking to walk together in peace and harmony, not in strife and turmoil. It is good to seek common ground, but not at the expense of the truth. Then, we see the word **“envying”**. Envy causes everyone trouble at sometime in their life. Envy is one of the chief devices of satan to cause the children of God trouble in this world. We see others with a

bigger house, a nicer car, a larger bank account, and find ourselves envying what they have. Not a good thing! Let us then walk as **“children of the day”** in godliness before the Lord and all men. Think about it!

... 11-11-14

Romans 13:14, **“But put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof.”**

“Who being the brightness of his glory, and the express image of his person...” (Hebrews 1:3). Paul declares the oneness of Christ and God the Father by using the expression **“express image of his person.”** By nature, we have the image of our parents to a certain degree. It is amazing how some children are almost carbon copies while others bear very little resemblance or none at all. Even children of the same parents are very different in appearance, personalities, and the general way they act. While everyone that Jesus died for will live with Him in Paradise and are His children by adoption, it was **“the will of him that sent me...”** (Christ), **“...that ever one which he hath given me I should lose nothing, but should raise it up again at the last day”** (John 6:40). Therefore, we should put on the Lord Jesus Christ so that our actions, our personalities, and even our appearance can be likened unto Christ. In chapter six of the Ephesian letter, the Apostle Paul speaks of putting on the whole armour of God. If we would do so, and keep it on, it would help tremendously in how we reflect the image of our heavenly Father. Notice the second part of this 14th verse, as it is so expressive in revealing the true nature of our problem when we don't take on the appearance of Christ outwardly. It says, **“...make not provision for the flesh...”** If you have on the proper clothing (armour), it will cover up or hide the natural flesh, both literally and figuratively. Our bodies of flesh bear the fleshly nature of sin, and by nature wants and desires **“to fulfil the lust”** housed in it. This is our own personal warfare which we must fight if we are to overcome the flesh and reflect the image of our Lord like we should. David knew the natural armour of King Saul would not be what he needed, but rather chose to cover himself with the godly armour (already proven by David slaying a lion and a bear) which only the Lord can provide (see I Samuel ch. 17). Likewise, we are to have our **“... loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness; And your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; Above all, taking the shield of faith...”** Then we are to **“...take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God”** (Ephesians 6:13-17). When we are born again of the Spirit of God, we bear the

image of Christ inwardly. Isn't it high time we did a better job of bearing His image outwardly by **“letting our light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven”**? (Matthew 5:16). Think about it!

... 11-12-14

Romans 12:1, **“I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service.”**

We do not use some of the same language today that was used in the “Kings English” as it was translated from the original text. The word “beseech” is not in my daily vocabulary. It relates to all those who read it, a sense of urgency in which Paul desires for the Roman brethren to pay close attention. If he wanted this sense of urgency, then why and what was it that he wanted such an immediate response in their actions? Beginning with chapter 12 of Romans, Paul expresses what has been termed as “practical godliness”, or, walking uprightly, honestly, and righteously before God in keeping His commandments. These “righteous works” were not to get them to heaven, but were to be done because of the righteous works which Jesus did for us which we could not do for ourselves. This is indicated by the next statement in this verse, **“by the mercies of God”**. If we are to be doers of the word and not just hearers (James 1:22), then we need to know what to do. Paul says, in answering the “What”, is to **“present your bodies a living sacrifice.”** This declaration is in direct opposition to what the Jewish law had been teaching concerning the sacrifices being offered in the temple worship. Now, Christ has come and has been offered as the ultimate sacrifice on the Cross of Calvary to God in our stead, therefore, in answering “Why”, the New Testament followers of Christ are to learn that presenting our bodies as the sacrifice in service to God (works) are not for obtaining heaven, but are to be done to give praise, honor, and glory to His great name. Paul is writing this letter to the **“brethren”** at Rome that had already been born of the Spirit of God, had heard the gospel preached, and needed strong admonition to stand against the unbelievers among them. What peace and comfort it must have been to these “Roman Brethren” to hear this news from Paul that their efforts in serving the Lord would be seen as **“holy, acceptable unto God”** if done in the proper way and for the right reason. How I wish that more brethren and sisters today could see that the importance is not to be acceptable to man, but acceptable unto God (pleasing). When I was able to please my mother in something I did, it made me at rest with my soul. Even more so is the

peacefulness my soul feels in knowing our heavenly Father is pleased with our meager service to His great name. Jeremiah (10:6), concerning His name, **“O LORD; thou art great, and thy name is great in might.”** When we are blessed to feel His presence among us, we can know that He is pleased and merciful to us sinners. All that we do in the service of God is but our **“reasonable service”**. We are not to be exalted, nor receive any accolades. All the praise, honor, and glory is to go to God as David said, **“I will call upon the LORD, who is worthy to be praised: so shall I be saved from mine enemies”** (Psalm 18:3). I beseech you brothers and sisters to Think about it!

... 11-14-14

Romans 12:2, **“And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.”**

Paul is giving some good admonition to the Roman brethren in chapter 12. When something is “conformed” it is likened unto an image of something the maker is trying to have it look like. When we are conformed to an image, it means we take on its appearance, its actions, its likes and dislikes and etc. If there is anything a child of God does NOT need to be conformed to (look like) it is this evil, sin cursed world we live in. We are not talking about the beauty of nature here, but rather our personalities, our actions, and our mindset taking on the sinfulness of this world. Paul said not to! He goes from the negative (be not conformed) to the positive (but be ye transformed) by our minds being renewed with the righteousness of Christ. Plainly stated, our minds are to be Christ centered, not worldly centered. How do we renew our mind? By the reading and study of God’s written word, by listening intently to the preached gospel, by praying often to our Lord, and by meditating on godly things daily. By doing these four things we then can prove (come to know of a truth) “what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God”. Isn’t that what we are to be doing because of all that He has done for us? We are forever in debt to our Saviour of which we will never be able to repay. The Lord shed His blood for His children without putting a charge on it that He knew we could not repay, but we sure should try. Our sin debt was so high that all the ticker tape in the world would not be able to list the charges of sin. We should be so thankful that it was within the perfect will of God to send His Son to do that which we could not do for ourselves. Thank you Lord! Think about it!

... 11-17-14

Romans 12:3, **“For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith.”**

The Apostle Paul began verse three of Romans 12 by declaring his authority to speak that which he is about to say; **“through the grace given unto me”**. Way too often I have heard folks who thought way to highly of themselves, get on their soapbox and try to tell everyone their opinion of how things ought to be. We used to call such ones *“know it alls”* back in the dark ages of the fifties and sixties. There are, I am sad to say, a few people like that even today.

No man or woman should allow pride to creep into their being and cause them to **“think of himself more highly than he ought to think.”** When a man or woman thinks this way, they are always ready to express their opinion on a variety of subjects. If you have a question, just ask them as they have the answer, from politics to religion. I remember such a man one time who attempted to tell me what Primitive Baptist believe concerning Predestination. His concept wasn't even close to what the bible teaches and yet he considered himself an authority on the subject. Paul told the Corinthian brethren in I Corinthians 4:6 for them to **“...learn in us not to think of men above that which is written, that no one of you be puffed up for one against another.”** It is not a godly trait for someone to be **“puffed up”** thinking they know more than others. Paul goes on to say in I Corinthians 8:2, **“And if any man think that he knoweth any thing, he knoweth nothing yet as he ought to know.”** In the latter part of Romans 12:3, we find some very good admonition our proper and godly attitude of ourselves. We are to **“think soberly”** which means to think clearly, calling upon the Spirit of God to aid us. Our Lord said it all when He said, **“Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls”** (Matthew 11:29). So, let us by the grace of God, understand our dependence on our Saviour in all things we set our hands to do. *Think about it!*

... 11-18-14

Romans 12:4-5, **“For as we have many members in one body, and all members have not the same office: So we, being many, are one body in Christ, and every one members one of another.”**

Our natural bodies have many parts; the head, arms, legs, liver, eyes, and so forth. Couldn't name them all anyway as I wasn't that good at Biology. It doesn't take a degree from any University to know that each body part has its own usage and purpose as determined by our creator, God. Paul is not speaking of the natural body, though he uses it to form an analogy. He is alluding to the church of the Lord Jesus Christ and its makeup. A number of people make up a local church assembly of believers but they don't all have the same calling (the same purpose or office to fill in the church). It saddens me when some older members begin to feel their usage to the church is no longer needed. Right the contrary! Their collective wisdom is very important to the younger ones coming on. We must all remember that each member has an office to fill. It may be as a minister, as a deacon, offering public prayer, leading the singing, or sitting on the pew and praying for a blessed service.

Our non-members are also important to the church body as their rejoicing in the truth and the prayers offered up help so much in a feeling of warmth and joy within the church. Whatever our situation, we all should be like minded in praying for the blessing of God's Spirit to be among us as we worship the one true and living God. How **"Can two walk together, except they be agreed?"** (Amos 3:3). This was surely the case on the day of Pentecost. In Acts 2:1 we find **"...when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place."** Many of the saints of God were gathered in one place and were all like-minded in bringing glory to the Lord. They **"continued daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, did eat their meat with gladness and singleness of heart"** (Acts 2:46). We should never compromise the true principles of scripture just to "get along". Rather, as in Romans 12, where Paul was teaching them to come together as many members, they were to be one body of believers. On the day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit brought them all together as one for the purpose of giving glory to God. In Acts 4:21 to vs. 24 we find Peter and John being threatened for speaking the things which God had given them of the gospel. A devoted body of believers were waiting for them when they heard that they had been released and **"...they lifted up their voice to God with one accord, and said, Lord, thou art God, which hast made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all that in them is:..."**

There are many people in the world today that do not believe in Christ, or God, or the Holy Spirit. Some claim some sort of deity but not of Christian belief. Let us as believers of our Saviour Jesus Christ, all find common ground among us to stand against the attacks being made on Christianity and that which is just and right. Let us adhere to the teaching of Paul and walk together in true understanding of this

verse, **“So we, being many, are one body in Christ, and every one members one of another”** (Romans 12:5). *Think about it!*

...11/19/14

Romans 12:6, **“Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us...”**

God is so good to us human kind. Not only does He love His children to the extent that He sent His Son to die for us and thus save us from our sins, but He also gives us gifts which, on our own merit, we do not deserve. Here in the 12th chapter of Romans, we find a number of different gifts which God so graciously gives to His children. We do not have or will be given the same gifts as it is according to His grace that they are given at all. There are gifts of prophecy, the ministry, teaching, exhortation, giving, as rulers, in showing mercy, and in brotherly love.

1 - While there are no more prophets as there were in old testament times. In the times of the apostles, they were to prophesy in bringing together the prophesy of the Old Testament with its fulfillment by Christ. The only prophecy we can do is to tell the truths of God’s promises. One such promise is that He (Jesus) is coming back for us at the time of the Resurrection (hooray). These truths are alluded to in Acts 1 when two men in white apparel said, **“Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven.”** You see, true prophecy (biblical truths) come to pass while false prophecy only gives false hope.

2 - Those men who have been called as Aaron was called, have a high calling of God to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and to comfort God’s people. Jesus told Peter to feed his lambs, to feed his sheep, and to feed his sheep. Good gospel food will satisfy the soul of a hungry child of God. The Lord told Jeremiah in 3:15, **“And I will give you pastors according to mine heart, which shall feed you with knowledge and understanding.”** The gift to pastor was given unto those God ordained and these men are then given to God’s children as a gift to lead and instruct in the ways of righteousness.

3 - Every preacher should be able to teach and should teach by means of the gospel and by their walk. What is it they are to teach? - The good news of Jesus Christ and Him crucified - a resurrected Saviour. Aged men and aged women are to teach the younger ones by their experience and wisdom. In Titus 2:2-5 we find the aged men were to teach by being **“sober, grave temperate, sound in faith, in charity, and in patience”** (vs 2). Then the aged women were to teach likewise, **“that they be in behaviour as becometh holiness, not false accusers, not given to much wine,**

teachers of good things;” (vs. 3-4) which included being sober, loving their husbands, loving their children, being “...discreet, chaste, keepers at home, good, obedient to their own husbands...” (vs 5).

4 - Some may have the gift of exhortation (admonishing and encouraging) the children of God. Godly exhorting can be done one-on-one, or can be done in a church setting. Aquila and Priscilla exhorted Apollos. “...**They took him unto them, and expounded**” (taught) “**unto him the way of God more perfectly**” (Acts 18:26).

5 - As God has blessed you, then you are to freely give - give of your time, your energy, your heart felt prayers and your substance as the Lord has blessed you. The widow, remember, gave her mite. Paul spoke of the churches of Macedonia, “**How that in a great trial of affliction the abundance of their joy and their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality**” (II Corinthians 8:2). They gave (supported) the work of the apostles even when they themselves were in deep poverty.

6 - If we have been given a gift to rule or lead others, we should exercise it with all humility and God honoring discretion, ever looking to the Lord to grant us wisdom to rule according to the Lord’s will (what is pleasing to Him). “**The God of Israel said, the rock of Israel spake to me, He that ruleth over men must be just, ruling in the fear of God**” (II Samuel 23:3). The gift of being a ruler is not to be taken lightly, but “**in the fear of God**”.

7 - The last two mentioned are mercy and brotherly love. These too, are gifts of God which we must learn to use wisely. Without brotherly love it is impossible for one to show mercy unto others. If we cannot have mercy and forgive others, then why would we think that God would show mercy unto us. He shows us mercy because of the love He has for His children, but NOT because He is under any obligation to do so. As our elder brother, He loves us with an everlasting love. Paul said, “**And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ’s sake hath forgiven you**” (Ephesians 4:32). We are to remember that the greatest of the commands was charity (I Corinthians 13:13). The Lord has given these gifts and others unto His children. We surely should endeavor with every fibre of our being to exercise (use) whatever gift or gifts He has given unto us. Our prayer unto the Lord is that He will show mercy in helping us to use our God-given gifts (talents) to His praise, honor, and glory. “**Think About It**”

... 11-20-14

Romans 12:9, **“Let love be without dissimulation. Abhor that which is evil; cleave to that which is good.”**

I love scriptures that are so plain that no one should misunderstand what it means. This is one such verse. The word **“dissimulation”** means to be without hypocrisy or pretense. A pet peeve of mine is to be around people in which you do not know where they are coming from. You have no idea what it is they believe or what they stand for. Give me an up-front person anytime. Paul tells the Roman brethren to let their **“love”** (respect and caring) **“be without dissimulation”** (hypocrisy). He says this in the middle of instructing and admonishing them about the makeup of the church body (vs 5), getting along with others (vs 10), and being of **“the same mind”** (vs 16) toward each other.

There was much turmoil over past beliefs and many of those who now embraced the truths of Jesus Christ were being held in scrutiny by the church at Rome. Both Jew and Gentile were embracing the gospel and this was a good thing, but they all needed to be taught godly principles. A new commandment was given in John 13:34-35 concerning proper love, **“...That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another.”** And again we find James making this statement in James 2:8, **“If ye fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself, ye do well:...”** One cannot love others for the cause of Christ without any pretense (dissimulation) if they love them and will care for them as they love and care for themselves. Romans 12:9 is as strong a statement of godly behavior as you will find. Paul competes this thought by saying we must hate (abhor) any and all things which are sinful (evil). We cannot accept anything ungodly into our lives by saying *“well, it won't hurt anything.”* Yes! It will! We cannot **“cleave to that which is good”** if we are holding on to that which is evil. The Lord said, **“No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon”** (Matthew 6:24). Let us cleave to the words of our Lord in John 15:9, **“As the Father hath loved me, so have I love you: continue ye in my love.”** Think About It!

... 11-25-14

Romans 12:11, **“Not slothful in business, fervent in spirit; serving the Lord;”**

There are a number of words that were used a great deal when I was a young boy that are no longer in today's vocabulary. One such word is "slothful". We surely

would not want to hurt someone's feelings by telling them they were not getting the job done, or that they were maybe just plain "lazy". Today's society has become a society of not dealing with reality, but of some fantasy world where everyone is entitled. This is one reason why we have so many different types or versions of the bible. The true unadulterated Word of God found in the King James Translation (KJV) has been watered down in the new, modern versions so it will not "hurt" anyone's feelings and supposedly make the bible easier to read. For example, the NIV says, "Never lacking in zeal". One can have plenty of zeal but have it pointed in the wrong direction. The lesson in the first part of Romans 12:11 is one of not being slack in business. The reference to business is not even mentioned in the NIV. If we are slothful in business we do not take care or provide for our families or the household of faith (church) as we should. Paul told Timothy in I Timothy 5:8, **"But if any provide not for his own, and specially for those of his own house, he hath denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel."** Did you notice how serious this is? Many of us may have failed in this area but should be willing to admit it and ask for forgiveness where we come up short and then get with it. When we do not serve the Lord with all of our heart, understanding the godly teachings as found in the Word of God (the bible), then we will be slack (slothful) in many areas of our lives. The bible teaches us the better way to be fervent in business and in our spiritual lives while serving the Lord as we are commanded. Notice the scripture which the lawyer quoted to Christ in Luke 10:27 . He quoted it from Deuteronomy 6:5, **"And thou shalt love the LORD thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might."** There is no slothfulness found in this verse whether it be in business, in taking care of our families, in providing for the welfare of the church, or our blessed privilege of serving the Lord. Don't be slothful, but rather be fervent. Think About It!

... 10-3-14

I Corinthians 1:13, **“Is Christ divided? was Paul crucified for you? or were ye baptized in the name of Paul?”**

During the years I have seen families divided over both petty issues and serious ones. The same goes for churches! Some of the most ridiculous things have divided brethren and sisters in churches of all denominations. End result many times were 1st. XYZ Church, then a 2nd. XYZ Church, and etc. because of not being able to get along and being of the same mind in serving the Lord.

The Apostle Paul became extremely disturbed over issues that were not petty, but were serious in nature. In I Corinthians 1:11, Paul expresses the seriousness of the problem by asking the question, **“Is Christ divided?”** Many of the brethren that should have known better had begun to line up with one or the other of the apostles and were not **“joined together in the same mind”** (vs 10) as they needed to be. Some of the new converts (believers) were paying more attention to giving credit unto Paul and others of the disciples instead of unto the Lord. We have no right to pay allegiance unto anyone other than unto our Lord Jesus Christ. This troubled Paul so much that he was thankful unto God **“that he had baptized none of them but Crispus and Gaius”** (vs 14). Pastors and preachers are to be godly loved and prayed for, but not to be idolized or worshiped. The best reference of this teaching is found in Acts 14:15 which says, **“Sirs, why do ye these things? We also are men of like passions with you, and preach unto you that ye should turn from these vanities unto the living God, which made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all things that are therein...”** The people had gone so far as to say **“The gods are come down to us in the likeness of men”** (Acts 14:11) which strongly upset Paul and Barnabas. The healing which Paul had just administered came not from his own power, but was of God. They were still seeing some of the same problems they had experienced earlier of not giving all of the credit to God rather than man. If you as an individual, or your church is divided, it could be because either you or

the church is looking more to individuals rather than unto God for guidance and leadership. This is so very true for our nation as well. God help us to be **“joined together in the same mind”** and that mind be of Christ. Think about it!

Discerning The Signs Bobby Willis 10-6-14

There is not much which will compare with a beautiful sunset. This past Saturday I included such a sunset which had been shared with us by our sister-in-law, Charlotte, from their home in Gultrie, OK. Sunsets are breath taking, the handy work of our Lord for us to enjoy while we face so many trials and heartaches in this life. There is an old saying which came from God’s word. It went like this: *“Red sky at morning, sailors take warning; Red sky at night, sailors' delight.”* Turning to Matthew 16:2-3, we find the Lord speaking the following to the Pharisees and Sadducees who had come tempting and desiring for Christ to show them a sign from heaven: **“He answered and said unto them, When it is evening, ye say, It will be fair weather: for the sky is red. And in the morning, It will be foul weather to day: for the sky is red and lowering. O ye hypocrites, ye can discern the face of the sky; but can ye not discern the signs of the times?”**

The accusers (Pharisees and Sadducees) had come seeking a sign that Jesus was truly the Son of God; the Messiah sent from heaven for they did not believe him to be the Christ. The Lord called them **“A wicked and adulterous generation”**. He went on to tell them in Matthew 16:4 that, “there shall no sign be given unto it, but the sign of the prophet Jonas.” After this declaration, He **“left them, and departed”**. Even some of His disciples were weak in the faith at times as we are. Philip asked him, **“Lord, show us the father, and it sufficeth us. Jesus saith unto him, Have I been so long time with you, and yet hast thou not known me, Philip? he that hath seen me hath seen the Father: and how sayest thou then, Show us the Father?”** (John 14:8-9). John the Baptist, who had baptized the Lord and had witnessed the voice of God which spoke aloud that Jesus was the Son of God, still grew weak in the faith while in prison and sent two of his (John’s) disciples to ask, **“Art thou he that should come? or do we look for another...”** (Matthew 11:3). Dear children of God, He has come and He has delivered, and He has ascended back to the Father and is seated on His right hand. What better sign do we need than what we find in knowing and believing this to be true and can declare as Peter did in Matthew 16:16 when he said, **“Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God.”** Amen and Amen! **Think about it!**

Whirlwind

Water spouts in Mobile Bay were not to uncommon when I was growing up. Dad and I went fishing in the delta a number of times and if the wind got up, seeing a Water Spout was more entertaining than threatening. Hurricanes are fairly common in our area of the country and three big ones come to mind; Camille in 1969, Frederick in 1979, and Katrina in 2005. Memories of each are not fond ones! Tornadoes are another thing: Not wanted, Not needed, and not planned. I have seen loss of life and severe damage from all three wind related types of bad weather. A whirlwind doesn't even sound good when you really think about it. The word **"whirlwind"** is found some 27 times in scripture with several different usages. One of the most used or quoted good usages is in 2nd. Kings 2:1 concerning Elijah. **"And it came to pass, when the LORD would take up Elijah into heaven by a whirlwind, that Elijah went with Elisha from Gilgal."** The end result is found in verse 11, **"And it came to pass, as they still went on, and talked, that, behold, there appeared a chariot of fire, and horses of fire, and parted them both asunder; and Elijah went up by a whirlwind into heaven."** There are two times in the book of Job where the **"LORD answered Job out of whirlwind"** and gave him valuable instruction (Job 38:11 & Job 40:6).

Solomon spoke much as his father David did concerning the destruction the whirlwind causes to the fearful and those who were to feel the wrath of God. God used the **"whirlwind"** several times as a means of judgment rendered unto the wicked (Proverbs 1:27 and 10:25). In Isaiah the **"whirlwind"** would be used to chase several unruly nations, then to see some blowed upon and to wither, then be taken away as stubble. Isaiah 41:6 even said the **"whirlwind shall scatter them"** (Meaning God's righteous judgment). The prophet Isaiah was told by God that **"the LORD will come with fire, and with his chariots like a whirlwind."** The prophet Jeremiah spoke similar language in (4:13, 23:19, 23:19, and 30:23). Over and over again the **"whirlwind"** relates to the wrath of God and how He has his way when opposed by Satan as the devil causes trouble for God's children. It is used several more times in the Old Testament, one of which was mentioned earlier when **"Elijah went up by a whirlwind into heaven."** God's power is unmeasured and unmeasurable. He has **"power over all flesh"**, he has **"power over the clay"**, he has **"power over the nations"**, he has **"power over waters"**, he has **"power over fire"** and He has power over **"sin and death."** Yes, ten thousand times yes! He has ALL POWER, for **"...the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea and all that in them is..."** (Exodus 20:11). *Think about it!*

...04/30/14

2 Timothy 3:13, **“But evil men and seducers shall wax worse and worse, deceiving, and being deceived.”**

Paul was expressing to Timothy the persecutions he had been able to endure was only because the LORD had delivered him from them. We need God’s help to endure and overcome evil men and seducers who are pushing immoral values and scriptural untruths. It would do us all good to make sure we adhere, not to some mans teachings, but to the Word of God only as it is **“given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works”** (II Tim. 3:16-17). That about says it all. **“Think about it”**

2 Thessalonians 3:5, **“And the Lord direct your hearts into the love of God, and into the patient waiting for Christ.”**

Paul has just told the Thessalonian brethren that not only was the Lord faithful, but that he (Paul) had confidence they would remain faithful in doing the things which had been commanded of them. There are two points here in verse five to notice: 1) The Lord would do the directing (We have trouble without the guidance of God’s spirit). 2) Their hearts (minds) were to be INTO the love of God and INTO patient waiting for Christ. Notice: not pointed toward, not in the direction of, but, INTO. That means an intimate relationship of rejoicing in the love of God, then an intimate time of peace while we wait for Christ. Pray today, pray now for God’s spirit to direct us in all things pleasing to the Lord. **“Think about it”**

..04/25/14

One of the old songs we were raised up singing was *“Jesus, Lover of My Soul.”* Reflecting for a moment on the words of truth found in this song, we find we can to *“Thy bosom fly”* as Jesus is our **“hiding place”** (Ps. 32:7). We need no other refuge as **“God is our refuge and strength”** (Ps. 46:1). In addition, Christ is

all I want and all I need because we have “...**the fulness of him that filleth all in all**” (Eph. 1:23). And, we all know that He has “*Plenteous Grace*”, even “**He giveth more grace**” (James 4:5). Re-read the lyrics of this song soon. Why, just call it out this Sunday and feel the blessed truths that are supported by the Word of Truth, the Bible itself. 2 Timothy 4:17, “**Notwithstanding the Lord stood with me, and strengthened me; that by me the preaching might be fully known, and that all the Gentile might hear: and I was delivered out of the mouth of the lion.**”

There is so much in this one verse: Assurance, Strength, Boldness, Mercy, and Deliverance; all bundled up by Paul as he finishes his admonition to Timothy. Paul had been doubted and feared, yet his preaching was powerfully heard and believed as he had been delivered from the jaws of untruths and unbelief. Preach on, Apostle Paul, Preach on! Your testimony brings glory to the Lamb of God whom you once persecuted but died loving with all your soul, body, and spirit. “*Think about it*”

...04/21/14

Hebrews 2:1, “**Therefore we ought to give the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard, lest at any time we should let the slip.**”

The usage of the term “**we ought**” means just what it says: “**We Ought**”. What is it that we “*ought*” to do? Simple! Pay “**more earnest heed to the things which we have heard.**” The truths of the gospel of Christ which Paul is speaking of, instructs us of Eternal blessings and timely guidance for the child of God. Paul then gives a good reason why we should give heed. If we don’t pay more earnest heed to the truths of His Gospel we are vulnerable to falling to “**the wiles of the devil**” (Eph. 6:11). Perhaps we need to stand on solid ground wearing “**the whole armour of God**” lest we slip and fall into the sink holes of satan and dishonor God. There is No Comparison: The Rock (Christ) is far better than sinking sand. “*Think about it*”

...04/18/14

Philemon 1:4, **“I thank my God making mention of thee always in my prayers.”**

Following the example of the Apostle Paul would not be a bad idea. Paul is writing a letter to a dearly beloved brother and fellowlabourer and others who are following the teachings of Christ. This letter concerns Paul’s son, Onesimus. Onesimus was not his natural son, but was one which learned from Paul to the extent that Paul was like a Father in the Ministry to him. Paul tells Philemon and others that he makes mention of them always in his prayers. What a testimony! The love of Christ abounds in the heart of Paul as he comes to plead the case of Onesimus to those Paul has been praying for. Onesimus surely was humbled by this. We should be too! Christ pleads our case, seated on the right hand of the Father, making intercession for us. How humbling this is, and, how does it affect you as you THINK about it; or, does it? **“Think About It”**

...04/17/14

Psalms 4:5, **“Offer the sacrifices of righteousness, and put your trust in the LORD.”**

There was, during the life of the Israelites in Old Testament times, many sacrifices of bulls, goats, lambs, doves and such. I am thankful we do not have to do those sacrifices any longer as they were all fulfilled by Christ. However, are to present ourselves as “a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service” (Romans 12:1). Let us do so with all humility and reverence unto our Lord. Hebrews 8:6, **“But now hath he obtained a more excellent ministry, by how much also he is the mediator of a better covenant, which was established upon better promises.”**

The old covenant was filled with sacrifices and offerings and requirements of obedience of which man did a poor job of keeping. However, we now have a better covenant, one which extends mercy and is filled with grace, sufficient to keep us until the end while being enough also to deliver us to the portals of heaven itself. James 1:8, **“A double minded man is unstable in all his ways.”**

We are to “mortify the deeds of the flesh” (Romans 8:13). Our sinful nature prevents us from serving God as we ought. In Matthew 6:24, Jesus speaks of one who attempts to serve two masters; **“for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon”** (material wealth-money). The term “double-minded” comes

from the Greek word *dipsuchos* which means a person with two minds or souls. It is hard to believe and doubt; to love and hate; to be obedient and disobedient; or to have peace and be at turmoil; all at the same time. Only by abiding in the true vine (Christ) will it afford us the courage and strength to be stable. **“...but as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD.”** *“Think About It”*

James 2:8. “If ye fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself, ye do well:”

James tells us in verse 9 that we commit sin if we have respect to persons. In the previous verses of this chapter, he deals with having respect of persons due to their worldly social and economic status. “Loving thy neighbour” is not always easy nor is it always popular. One man told me it had been two years and he had not sinned during that time. My response? You just did! Either that man was true, or John was true as he wrote the inspired Word of God.
